


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## Meet the Sheriff


## **Booking Unit**

Through most of 2014 a new process was put into place to reduce the amount of time inmates spend in Booking. This process is called "first in, first up". The intent of the process is to take new arrestees, regardless of their arraignment status and put them through the Booking Process in an efficient manner. The result is Inmates spending less than 8 hrs. in the Booking Unit.

In August a multi-agency task force put together Operation "White Horse". This was an Arrest Warrant Raid designed to capture and incarcerate low to mid-level drug dealers and suppliers. This raid proved successful with The Booking Unit receiving and processing over 40 arrestees. The Booking Unit was prepared and this raid was handled professionally and quickly.

#### Aviation Unit

#### Some Highlights:

Air-1 was requested to assist Camillus PD locate two females who fled Wal-Mart after a larceny. Upon arrival they checked the area with the IR camera and located the females hiding in a wooded area. Ground units were directed to them and the females were taken into custody.

Air-1 responded to a vehicle pursuit involving a stolen vehicle from Monroe County. The pursuit was picked up on Milton Ave. near Horan Rd in the Town of Camillus. Air1 provided lighting and called out the vehicle's location. Stop sticks were successfully deployed on Rt. 31 near Connors Rd. in the Town of VanBuren and the suspect was taken into custody.

Air-1 was requested to assist Cicero PD locate a suicidal subject, high on heroin, who ran off into a wooded area near Rt. 31 and Century Dr. Upon arrival they checked the area and located the male walking along a wood line. Ground units were directed to him and he was taken into custody.

While on patrol, Air crew located marijuana plants growing along the RR tracks off Van Buren Rd. in the Town of Camillus. SIU notified and harvested 15 plants.

Air-1 was requested to assist Oswego County for a missing 14 yr. old Project Lifesaver victim near State St. in the Village of Phoenix. Upon arrival they were able to pick up a signal in the area of Rt. 57 and Rt. 264. Ground units were notified and located the child.

Air1 was requested to assist with locating lost hikers in Highland Forest. Upon searching the area, they located the lost hikers near a clearing. They were able to land and extract the hikers to an area where fire personnel were waiting.

#### Some highlights:

Detectives investigated a pair of robberies at the First Niagara Bank on Oswego Rd and the Sunoco station on Buckley Rd, both in the Town of Clay. Investigation connected both cases, and detectives arrested a 29 year old male suspect and charged him with robbery in both cases.

A case centered on a Craigslist ad for a cell phone, when the victim arrived at an apartment house near the OCC Campus the victim was assaulted and robbed in the building's hallway. Four OCC Students were arrested in this incident.

#### K-9 Unit

Conducted numerous narcotics searches throughout 2014 which resulted in multiple arrests and drug seizures. The narcotics searches were also responsible for the seizure of over \$31,000.00 in cash.

Deputy Graham and K9 Erny responded to 14 Candlelight Lane in the Town of Clay to assist the State Police with locating a wanted fugitive. The subject had multiple felony warrants and fled State Police units on foot. After conducting an on lead search of the area, K9 Erny located the subject inside a laundry room of one of the apartment buildings. The subject gave up after Deputy Graham announced K9 warnings. The subject was taken into custody without incident.

K9 Detector School responded to the area of 7549
Oswego Rd in the Town of Clay to assist road patrol
with a robbery complaint. Upon arrival units on scene
advised that a black female suspect fled the scene on
foot armed with a handgun. Deputy Neal and K9 Drago
conducted a track of the suspect. K9 Drago's track
pushed the suspect out of the woods to a Columbia
County K9 unit that was on the perimeter. The suspect
gave up after a short foot pursuit and when K9 warnings
were given.

#### Patrol Section

#### A few 2014 highlights:

Deputy Munroe was conducting a vehicle and traffic stop in Shop City Plaza when a robbery occurred at the Family Dollar Store. Dispatch provided the description of the suspect. It was relayed that the suspect had left his benefit card in the store. She observed a male walking east through the parking lot matching the description. She approached the male and took him into custody without incident.

Sgt. Berlinski responded to a vehicle rollover. When arriving at the scene she discovered there was a 6 year old child stuck in the vehicle. The child's leg was trapped and a minor extrication was needed. It was necessary to break the window out to stabilize the child. Without regard for her own safety, she prevented serious injury or loss of life.

Deputy Sorbello and Deputy Adamo responded to a Burglary Alarm in the Town of Pompey. Upon their arrival they observed the front door of the residence open with a locked glass storm door. They noticed a female standing in the foyer of the residence, she appeared heavily intoxicated/EDP acting irrational and in need of medical attention, Deputy Sorbello called for an ambulance and continued to try and communicate with the female while Deputy Adamo went around the back and gained entrance to the residence, placing the female in handcuffs for her safety and his. Deputy Adamo was able to locate a suicide note and several empty prescription bottles in the residence. If not for their quick and decisive actions, the incident could have been a fatality.

#### Truth Verification Unit

In 2014 the Truth Verification Unit experienced a 19% increase in examination requests. Preemployment Polygraphs were conducted for all OCSO Departments

as well as several other local police departments and corrections agencies. Several Specific Issue Polygraph examinations conducted for criminal investigation were instrumental in gaining suspect confessions and successful case closure. In two such cases, suspects made felony level admissions.

#### Warrants Unit

Task force personnel assisted the T/Geddes PD on a bank robbery that occurred on Onondaga Blvd. Members were instrumental in identifying the suspect and recovering a bank device.

Task force personnel located and arrested a 30 yr. old w/m in Oswego on a Federal VOP for the Adam Walsh Act, originating out of the State of Tennessee.

Task force personnel located and arrested a 21 yr. old white male at 113 Sabine St. on a violation warrant out of Syracuse PD.

Task force personnel located and arrested a 25 yr. old white male at a South Bay Rd. address on a Felony warrant for sex offenses out of the Orange County, Fla. Sheriff's Office. He was lodged at the Justice Center pending an extradition hearing.

Task force personnel located and arrested a 49 yr. old black male at a Merriman Ave. address who was wanted on a warrant from Oneida County for Sexual Abuse 3rd, Forcible Touching and Endangering the Welfare of a Child. The suspect was turned over to Oneida County Sheriff's Investigators.



## Code of Ethics of Deputy Sheriff

*As a Deputy Sheriff*, I recognize that I am given a special trust and confidence by the Sheriff and the public that I serve. This trust and confidence is my bond to ensure that I shall behave and act according to the highest professional principles. In furtherance of this pledge, I will abide by the following Code of Ethics:

*I SHALL ENSURE* that in the performance of my duties, I will enforce and administer the law according to the principles of the United States Constitution and applicable laws of our State, so that equal protection of the law and due process are guaranteed to everyone. To that end, I shall not permit personal opinions, biases, prejudices, party affiliation or consideration of the status of others to alter or lessen these principles.

*I SHALL DEMONSTRATE* standards of behavior consistent with the responsibilities, duties, obligations and functions of a Deputy Sheriff.

*I SHALL NOT ENGAGE IN NOR CONDONE* brutal, cruel, inhumane treatment of others or of inmates in my care and custody

*I SHALL ADHERE* at all times, to the standards and principles of honesty and integrity and I shall keep my private life unsullied as an example to all

ISHALL ENSURE that there is proper use and accountability of property and funds entrusted to my care

*I SHALL PRACTICE* sound judgments and decisions in fulfilling the assigned responsibilities, duties and functions of my position as Deputy Sheriff

*I SHALL ENDEAVOR* to maintain those standards of objectivity and merit for which I was hired, to the best of my ability

*I SHALL ENDEAVOR* to perform my duties in a competent and excellent manner according to the standards given to me in my training and supervision

*I SHALL ENSURE* that during my tenure I shall not use the position of Deputy Sheriff for personal gain or self-aggrandizement and I will conduct myself in the position of Deputy Sheriff according to the best of my skill and power

*IACCEPT* and will adhere to this Code of Ethics. In so knowing I also accept responsibility for encouraging others in my profession to abide by this Code
