PROJECT LIFESAVER PROGRAM

A PUBLIC SAFETY PROGRAM TO PROTECT AND LOCATE MISSING PERSONS DUE TO WANDERING

Project Lifesaver : A reliable rapid response

Project Lifesaver was established in April 1999 in Chesapeake VA with the goal of using state of the art technology to help locate people diagnosed with Alzheimer's who wandered. Onondaga County has been a participant since 2007 and serves as the Upstate Coordinator of Training for NY State. Our clients include the elderly as well as children with Autism, and Down Syndrome, and people with Traumatic Brain Injuries, and developmental delays. Project Lifesaver emphasizes relationships between specially trained Sheriff's personnel and the people who may wander **before** the need may arise for a rescue. Over 500,000

What happens when my loved one wanders?

If a loved one should wander off, a simple call placed to 911 will alert the Onondaga County Sheriff's search team.



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The Sheriff's Office can deploy up to three receivers, including one on Air-1, capable of identifying and locating a client's transmitter signal. people in the USA have Alzheimer's and related disorders. Well over 50% of these



people wander and become lost. Nearly half of those who

wander will die and

many become injured or fall victim to predators if they are not located within 24 hours.

The Sheriff's Air-1 Helicopter is capable of tracking a signal up to 10 air miles. It also can be used to direct search teams on the ground. Once a signal is picked up, our clients are most often located within 20-30 minutes.



<u>How does it work?</u>

A Project Lifesaver unit member will conduct a home visit and fit the client with a battery-operated transmitter that is worn



on the wrist or ankle. A tracking signal is emitted from the transmitter every second, 24 hours a

day. This signal can be tracked by our specially trained personnel on the ground and in the air. Family members and caregivers are also given a thorough overview of the program.
